Academic Competitions

Forensics

Description	Come one, come all! Act with your voice, your words, or your body. Enthrall an audience with the lilt of your voice, the power of your presence, and the force of your eyes. Forensics offers multiple means to hone your creative communication abilities. There are a total of sixteen forensic categories, each one catering to a different skill, interest, or personality. Whether you want to perform for laughs, tears, understanding, or to share knowledge forensics will improve your technique so that you may accomplish just that. In forensics you will have the opportunity to perform and excel both on an individual and team level. With twenty-five participants, you will be introduced to new and interesting people willing to aid in strengthening your vocal talents. Competitions take a number of Saturday mornings beginning in January and running through March.

Math Hawks

Description	Math Hawks are a group of students who enjoy mathematics and choose to compete against other schools on monthly math tests. The team goes to another school for the conference meet and all participating teams test on both a JV and Varsity level. Awards are determined by cumulative team scores. The conference competition is usually the first Monday in February. Here, awards are earned for the top placing school in the conference, and the first ten individuals also receive awards. This is a group that doesn't require much time commitment, and the math hawks can get a page in the year book. Students considering Math Hawks are encouraged to participate in monthly math competitions held after school to gain practice, but to also determine team rosters.
Prerequisite	Any student in a geometry or higher math class, and has a 3.0 GPA in math qualifies to be a Math Hawk . Talk to any math teacher about joining. Remember, there are only 8-10 Varsity and 8-10 JV spots on the team, so spaces may fill up fast and be competitive.
Commitment	Monthly practice competitions start in October and run through April.
Meet Time	Usually 3rd Tuesday of the month after school and then conference meet held in February.

ATHLETIC REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL ATHLETES

All students planning to participate in Athletics will need to have the following on file in the Athletic Office prior to being able to participate in any practice. Once these are completed, a student-athlete will receive a Red Card, which will be turned into their coach, and indicate they are cleared to practice.

2015-16 WIAA PHYSICAL CARDS

Before a student can participate in interscholastic athletics, the WIAA and Grafton High School requires written proof of current physical fitness as determined by a Licensed Physician or Advance Practice Nurse Practitioner. A student-athlete will need on file either a green WIAA Physical Card or a yellow Alternate Year Card (both cards are available in the GHS Office). ***The following guidelines determine which card is needed.*** Those with green Physical Cards on file dated between April 1, 2015 and March 31, 2015 have what is considered to be a current physical. These individuals will need only a yellow Alternate Year Card for the 2015-16 year. Physical cards that will be dated April 1, 2015 and after will be good for two school years, and will be on a green card. Those who have not had a physical since April 1, 2015, will need to schedule one.

Autos Competition

FORD-AAA STUDENT AUTO SKILLS COMPETITION

Description	The competition is co-sponsored by AAA and Ford Motor Company. Its objective is to encourage talented young people to pursue careers as automotive service technicians. Each participating automotive instructor selects their best 11th or 12th grade auto technology students to take the state qualifying exam, which is taken online and administered by a test proctor/ administrator at the school. The ten, 2-person teams scoring highest on the state qualifying exam then move on to the “hands-on “state finals scheduled in mid-May. In the “hands-on” competition, new Ford Motor Company vehicles are uniformly ‘bugged” so that each team has identical malfunctions to diagnosis and repair. The competition requires repairs to be made with the highest quality workmanship in the lowest total time. The winning two-person team from each state and their instructor are provided expense-paid trips to the national finals in June.

Commitment Varies. Tutors set up their own schedule with their tutee. Most usually meet once per week.

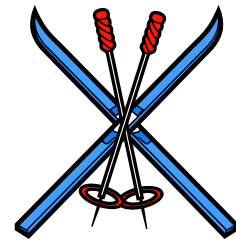
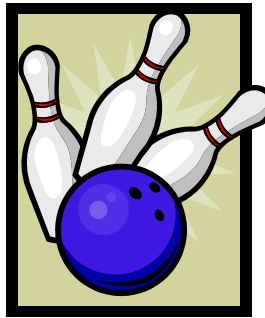
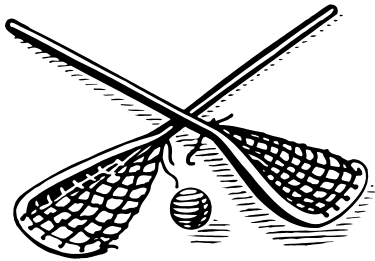
